HISTORY OF BARRY UNIVERSITY
Miami Shores, Florida

History of Barry University



Barry University did not have a casual beginning. Mother Mary Gerald Barry conceived the idea of a Catholic college for women in Florida. Mother Gerald and her two brothers, Reverend Patrick Barry and the Right Reverend Monsignor William Barry saw the need for a Catholic college for women since there was none at the time.

Finding a site for the college wasn't easy. After exploring through Miami, a site was chosen and the present location of Barry University, comprising of 40 acres, extending north from 111th Street to 115th Street between N.E. 2nd Avenue and North Miami Avenue.

On the historic days of September 16-18, 1940, the first registration were held; classes began on September 19, 1940.

There were no graduation ceremony in 1941, but an honors convocation was held in the rotunda. After Mass and breakfast June 5th, 1941, the students (40) departed from campus concluded their first year at Barry College.

In 1974 Sister M. Trinita Flood during her presidency organized the college into six instructional units, the School of Business being one of them.

The University became officially co-educational in 1975 with male students admitted to all majors and living on campus for the first time.

Barry University has had five Dominican Sisters serve as president since its beginning: Mother Gerald Barry, 1940-1961; Mother Genevieve Weber, 1961-1963; Sister M. Dorothy Browne, 1963-1974; Sister M. Trinita Flood, 1974-1981; and Sister Jeanne O'Laughlin, 1981 to the present.

Today, at the beginning of each semester, Barry University opens its doors to approximately 6000 students, and thousands have graduated with bachelor's and/or master's degrees in many fields of study.

The School of Health and Natural Science has 6.6% of there 6000, the School of Adult and Continuing Education 34.6%, the School of Arts and Science 20%, the School of Education 8.4%, the School of Nursing 19.8% and finally the School of Business 10.6%.

All these students can also be classified in various other ways which was done to have a more complete overview of the mixture and setup of our student body. We have out of these approximately 6000 students 75.2% undergraduates and 24.8% graduates which we can further up divide to 63.6% part-time students and 36.4% full-time students.

At Barry University, we still have an overwhelming majority of female students 62.4%. This might bring to mind, the origins of Barry, but there is a vast difference between now and then. The 37.6% of the male body is not believed to stay so but will increase as the years go by.

The spread of the students as far as enrollment is concerned is not an even one. There is a 35.5% of freshmen, 10.7% of sophomores, 14.1% of juniors, 7.5% of seniors, of unclassified undergraduates 24.8%. As can be seen, the percentage of freshmen and graduates comprises the two largest groups at Barry University and we are proud to say that each year we are attracting more and more students making our freshmen group each year larger that the year before.

Barry University is living testimony to hard work, perseverance and belief in God Almighty. The "founding parents" would be as proud of the results as we all are in having an institution with a record of excellence and such promisory future.

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS



Barry College did not have a business division until 1968. The school realized there was a need for a business department since business is a very integral and important part in the world. At the time of its creation, the School of Business was not an independent school but part of the school of Arts and Sciences.

The School of Business became a functional unit with its own power of attorney under the direction of Sister Trinita Flood. Since its installment the School of Business has followed the mission of Barry by implementing and striving to reach its goals. The operational goals the School has established are:

To meet the professional educational needs of the society within the mission and resources of the University and the School of Business.

To interpret Barry University to various professional public as an institution offering quality education, assuring religious dimension, and providing community service and presence within a caring community.

To raise the quality of life for students, faculty and staff.

To provide adequate resources to support the purpose of the School of Business and the University.

To maintain an ongoing planning process.

In September 1984, the Barry University School of Business moved into a newly completed D. Inez Andreas building. The 35,000 square foot structure was designed especially to contain the School of Business. It was named after D. Inez Andreas to honor her and thank her for major contributions made to Barry University.

The School of Business offers undergraduate majors in Accounting, Economics, Finance, Management, Management Information Systems, and Marketing. These major areas of studies are built upon a solid foundation of liberal arts and a broad based core of general business subjects.

Graduate programs include the Master of Business Administration, Master of Professional Accountancy and the Executive MBA program for middle and upper level managers.

While academic programs conform to accepted standards, the programs offered are unique in many ways. We practised and have proof of our belief that leadership is an essential element for success in any endeavor and that small classes allow development of interpersonal relationships an exercise of these leadership abilities.

Faculty members are expected to be professionals in their respective fields and to demonstrate professionalism and leadership in the classroom. Regardless of the specific major, the academic approach is from the real world practical application approach rather than a theoretical approach centered on giant corporation. Even though the faculty members are capable and dedicated teachers who care that learning does indeed take place, they are also involved with students in many activities including participation in various professional organizations. Time is taken to be in touch with the students.

The School of Business also promotes private free enterprise, entrepreneurship, leadership, professionalism and business and professional ethics. All of the aforementioned ensure that graduates of the Barry University School of Business are uniquely and totally different from

graduates of the mass education institution.

Strategic planning for the future makes it easy for Barry University School of Business to rise up and meet head on every challenge it is confronted with. Creation of several units for a more aggressive development of the students include the Small Business Institute, the Association of Young Entrepreneurs. Several others like the Center for Business and Professional Ethics, and Executive Associates are projects that are hoped to be accomplished in the near future. In addition the School of Business, like the entire Barry University, is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Enhancement of the quality of our educational programs and excellence are top priorities within every move made, for the Barry University School of Business to reach each and every goal it has set out to accomplish.

History of Beta Upsilon

In 1911, the idea of a new professional business fraternity at the University of Michigan was first conceived. The first step was to contact the National Fraternity of Beta Sigma Phi in Chicago. This was done and received an enthusiastic response. Subsequent correspondence took place along both parties.

In the middle of January 1911, after a few weeks of consulting and the introduction of Beta Sigma Phi - Chicago Chapter, Mr. Powell was able to gather twenty members. Officers were elected. By January 27th 1911, a letter of intent was written and forwarded to the Central Office of Beta Sigma Phi, officially creating the Beta Upsilon Chapter.

History of Beta Upsilon Colony



In October 1990, the idea of having a professional business fraternity at Barry was born. Miguel Morales, our colony President wrote to the Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi in Oxford, Ohio and soon received an enthusiastic response. Continuous communications began among both parties.

In the middle of January 1991, after a few weeks of recruiting and the introduction of Delta Sigma Alumni - Carlos Hazday, Mr. Morales was able to gather twenty members. Officers were elected. By February 8TH 1991, a letter of intent was written and forwarded to the Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi, officially creating the Beta Upsilon Colony.

Throughout the Spring semester, the Beta Upsilon colony grew and was able to accomplish several activities. Highlighting the semester was our fund-raiser, "The Great American Delta Sigma Pi Pie Factory," held on April 12, 1991. Earlier in March, the colony was honored with the visit from C. Dean Ferguson, Director of Chapter Services. On April 25th 1991, the colony took a tour of the Intercontinental Bank's Operations Division, which signified the professionalism Delta Sigma Pi and our colony represented.

As the Spring semester ended, plans were already on the way for the Fall semester. Dates were being set for professional, social, fundraising and community activities.

The Fall semester offered three professional activities, two of which took place already, the third soon to come. The first was the visit to Santa Clara Studio on November 6th 1991, where club members got the chance to see a sneak preview of the actors "in action". Later on, the business manager gave a very detailed background on the business of filming a soap-opera. The second professional visit was a guided tour of Barnett Bank executive floor and a financial point of view speech given by Barnett's Vice President of Finance appointed director of the Bank Administration Institute. The third is to take place on December 4th 1991, Wometco Theatre speaker.

Club fund raising events were the 50/50 raffle and the famous Great American Delta Sigma Pi Pie Factory. The colony members also took part in Barry's Annual Food Drive for the poor and the homeless. Finally, the Fall semester will end with a christmas candy-gram fund raiser were candy-grams requests will be sent from one student to another wishing a great Christmas and good-luck in finals.

Social events for club members created a bonding process which was vital for making the colony a strong force on campus. Every so often on Thursday nights, particularly after club meetings, members would get together at the American Bandstand at Bayside. The members used this opportunity as an ideal way of bonding and a needed break from school. Other great social events were the club picnic at Haulover Beach and the volley-ball competition between clubs at Barry.

The future of the Beta Upsilon Colony looks very promising. All colony members are looking forward to pledging and becoming brothers. Several proposals have been made which should make the Fall 1991 better than the Spring and with success the goal of a Delta Sigma Pi and our colony represented be installed as a Chapter.

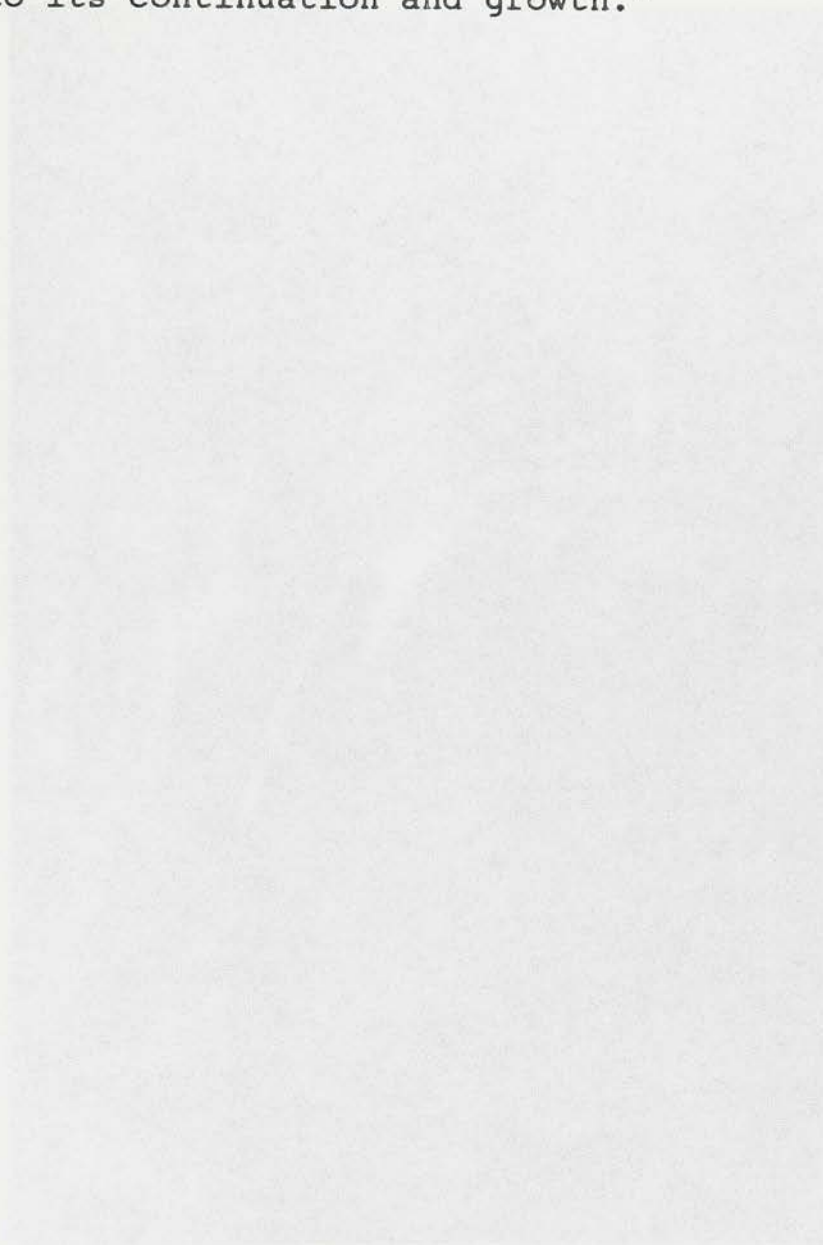
Dr. Lloyd D. Elgart
